The activities conducted by Anantapur Sports Academy (ASA) emphasise on the motto- sport is an effective and sustainable tool to promote socio-economic change among the underprivileged youth and children. In 2019-20, about 2,545 girls and 4,059 boys were trained in either cricket, football, hockey, softball, kabaddi, kho-kho or judo. RyDT's Sport for Development initiative has three levels and those are: Residential Program at ASV, the Grassroots Program and the Development Centres and all are operated by ASA.

ANANTAPUR SPORTS VILLAGE

Home to ASA, Anantapur Sports Village houses state-of-the-art infrastructure, along with a residential programme enables 146 aspiring and talented children, 45 girls and 101 boys, to actively pursue both education and sport. The residential program also ensures access to proper nutrition and health.

DEVELOPMENT CENTRES

ASA currently runs 3 Development Centres located in Bathalapalli, Atmakur and Dharmavaram. Cricket, Football, Hockey and Kabaddi are offered in these centres. 610 children actively attended daily training sessions at the Development Centres in 2019-20. The children and youth are ensured with a safe playing environment, necessary equipment, qualified coaches and sustained access to all the facilities

GRASSROOTS PROGRAMME

ASA Grassroots Programme is one of the Largest of its kind in India and it partners with local communities, subcentres and Government schools to ensure access to sport and encourage regular sports participation among children in remote villages. Through the Grassroots program, RyDT reached out to 5,848 children enabling them to exercise their freedom to play.

Athletes from ASA participate in different kinds of leagues and camps every year including Khelo India (Rural Competitions) at District, State and National levels.
ASA hosts Anantapur Football League (AFL), Anantapur Hockey League (AHL) and Ananta Premier League (APL) to create access to sport for rural youth and children. This is carried forward in collaboration with local and international clubs, providing necessary exposure and opportunities.

SUCCESS STORIES AT ASA

"I belong to a small village called Vasanthapuram. Both my parents are farmworkers, and I was the first girl in my family to take up sports. Many of my friends were married off at an early age of 16. I feel very fortunate to have found ASA at the right time", says B Maheshwari, a Hockey Player. RyDT's core strategy is to work towards gender discrimination and equal opportunities for girls and boys.

"The residential programme at ASV focuses on sport and academics equally. ASA makes us good sportspersons and also shapes us into well-educated and responsible citizens for tomorrow", explains K Varshini, a Judo player. Judo as a sport has seen a high surge of female participation as compared to the male participation.

"When I was 15, my football career started as a player at ASA. After reaching the national level, my aim was to bring change in rural communities. ASA gave me that opportunity to start my coaching career", says P. Hindu Kumar, a Football Coach at ASA.

Coaches and staff attended workshops at Manipal University to learn about latest trends, sport science and sport psychology. Over all, through the year from all sport disciplines, 111 youth and coaches were trained.

PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Supporting unemployed rural graduates by training them in English, foreign languages and soft skills to enhance their employability.

The fast changing technology and increasing demands of the current job market require the youth of today to up-skill their abilities. The employers look for employees with more holistic attributes such as softer competencies and person-centred qualities. The socio-economic background, place of residence and quality of education received, play a significant role in graduates' access to quality employment. This puts rural graduates, especially girls and people with disabilities at disadvantage.

The Professional School of Foreign Languages(PSFL) and the Professional School for Intensive English and Job Readiness were introduced with the aim to bridge this gap and encourage inclusion by training young graduates from underprivileged communities in skills required to attain a successful career and better future for themselves and their communities.

In the one-year intensive residential course, students are coached to strengthen their English skills and learn a new language up to a B1 level. At present, the schools offer French, Spanish and German, all taught by experienced teachers.

The course involves official examinations and certifications issued by reputed language institutes. Soft skills training is also a part of the curriculum, so the students are exposed to mock job interviews, computing, accounting and corporate culture. So far, 92% of the students secured jobs in different multinational companies.

The Professional School for Intensive English and Job Readiness

for girls was opened in the year 2017 in Bathalapalli to give an opportunity of professional education to disadvantaged female graduates, and in 2018 a special school for boys with disabilities was opened in Kuderu.

The six-month residential course focuses on English language and soft skills, giving students that boost of self-confidence and abilities to join the job market.

SUCCESS STORIES FROM THE PSFL

"I see a humongous change in the students at the end of the course. When they are newly enrolled, they seem to have no clue regarding the job they want to go for and a low self-confidence. But by the time they graduate, they get a new sense of identity and I feel overwhelmed and happy to see such changes", says Geetanjali, the principal of the school.

"The best thing that PSFL has given me are the soft skills. As a girl growing up in stringent and controlled surroundings, my parents didn't let me go around the street alone. I lacked the skills to be a part of this extremely competitive work sector, but now I am confident", says Mahaboob Jaan.

She was one of the 107 students enrolled in the Professional School for Foreign Languages in 2019-2020.

"After the completion of course I want to join a company that works in the field of electronics and telecommunications and needs German translations. I want to keep improving in both areas", says Harshith Gariga proudly. He pursued German language in PSFL in 2019-20.

Over 92% of the students stepped up into the job market after the completion of the course and got placed in different multinational companies. In the year, 2018-19, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed with the Sri Krishnadevaraya University (Andhra Pradesh) to recognise the PSFL course as an official post-graduate degree.

On 29th August 2019, RyDT, through the Anantapur Sports Academy received the prestigious Rashtriya Khel Protsahan Puraskar, the highest honour in Sport for Development in India, from the President of India.



Over the years Anantapur Sports Academy (ASA) has hosted several famous personalities. In the year 2019, Adam Gilchrist, a famous Australian cricketer visited ASA. "I am astonished to find such good sports facilities in a small place like Anantapur", says Adam Gilchrist with a smile.



The Professional School shifted to an online format in the month of March when the lockdown was imposed. "We did not want our students to lose 8 months of their hard work", says Geethanjali, the principal of PSFL.

The course examinations were completed by July 2020.
