The activities conducted by Anantapur Sports Academy (ASA) emphasize on the motto - sport is an effective and sustainable tool to promote socio-economic change among the underprivileged youth and children.

RyDT's Sport for Development initiative has three levels: The residential Program at ASV, the Grassroots Program, and the Development Centres.
However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, following the instructions of the Government of India, all the Grassroots and Development programs, Residential and Non-Residential Programs and other program-related activities to sports for development were stopped from 18th of March 2020.

All grounds and facilities, including Gymnasium and Athletic Track at ASV, were closed to the public until further notice.

During the subsequent COVID-19 Lockdowns, on-campus staff, and the support staff at ASV, the team at the Development Centres actively participated in various COVID-19 Relief programs carried out by RyDT.

Apart from COVID relief activities, several program-related initiatives and activities were undertaken during the lockdowns via digital platforms.

ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS CONDUCTED DURING THE YEAR:

COACH TO ATHLETE INTERACTION:

To keep athletes engaged and utilize the COVID Lockdowns as an opportunity to impart valuable knowledge and skills, ASA Coaches regularly interacted with athletes during the period of the lockdown. Regular sessions were conducted on COVID awareness, physical fitness, sport-specific theoretical classes, etc. The sessions also included quizzes on general knowledge and sports.

ASA COACH DEVELOPMENT WEBINARS:

ASA Coach Development Webinars were conducted with industry experts to educate and build the capacities of coaches. During these webinars, coaches had interactive sessions with doctors on COVID awareness and experts in the industry to prepare themselves for a future post-COVID.

NATIONAL SPORTS DAY CELEBRATIONS:

100 athletes participated in the National Sports Day-2020 Celebrations held via digital platforms. Children and youth remotely participated in painting, essay writing competitions, and pushup challenges.

ASA STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT WEBINARS:

Replacing 'Coach To Athlete Interactions', we organized Athlete Development Webinars for all sports with more formal and structured webinars for a month. Through these digital sessions, children and youth were trained in various areas equipping them with the requisite knowledge and skills to aid in their development.

The socio-economic background, place of residence, and quality of education received play a significant role in graduates' access to quality employment. However, rural graduates, especially girls and people with disabilities, are at disadvantage.

The Professional School of Foreign Languages(PSFL) and the Professional School for Intensive English and Job Readiness were introduced with the aim to bridge this gap and encourage inclusion by training young graduates from underprivileged communities in skills required to attain a successful career and better future for themselves and their communities.

The schools offer residential programs and follow similar curriculums based on the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFRL). However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic and following the instructions of the Government of India, the school shifted to a fully online program from 18th March 2020 until the end of the course in July 2020.

A system was set up within a few weeks where teachers connected with students virtually and conducted classes, but it was not without its own challenges. Since most students lived in villages, the poor network connectivity posed one of the main obstacles to their education. Not only attending but also viewing and uploading documents and assignments became a tedious task.

The official language examinations were conducted through IFLAC for A2 level and B1 levels.

Sri Krishnadevaraya University Postgraduate conducted an extraordinary examination to all the students enrolled in the school in order to receive a PG Diploma certificate.

The batch 2020-2021 of the Professional School was started on 1st December 2020 with significant improvement. Each of the 170 students was provided with tabs and headphones to ensure a hassle-free course for the first fully online batch.



"At the Professional School in BKS, I didn't have any problem because we had our teachers and peers with whom we could easily communicate face to face. But many of us live in remote villages, and we have network issues. Living with the family also means disturbances during class hours. My mother got angry because she assumed I was playing games on my phone. I have prepared and tried my best for these exams, but it has not been easy."

In January 2020, RYDT created the Centre for Human Resource Development, a hub of participatory training programs intended for the different cadre (Senior/Middle/Grassroot) staff associated with NPOs (Not-For-Profit) organizations and Community-Based Organizations covering both the members and leaders in the development sector.

COVID-19 RELIEF WORK







AWARENESS TO PROTECT LIVES

To burst myths and spread accurate information about how to prevent the spread of COVID-19 RYDT staff members conducted meetings with children and youth targeted the participants of the sports for development program and their families.

The organisation distributed 41 contactless infra-red thermometers to ensure regular tracking of children and youth's temperature alongside 205 litres of sanitizer to promote hygiene. It also distributed 400 soaps, 800 masks and COVID19 leaflets to 404 children in 10 villages.

A totasl of 900 masks were distributed among RYDT staff to help them follow the recommended safety measures.





FOOD and BASIC PROVISIONS DISTRIBUTION

As per the need and call given by the local government authorities, RyDT distributed a total of 1,24,846 cooked food packets in 31 locations including colonies of Ananthapuramu and for COVID19 positive tested people staying at the Ananthapuramu Government General Hospital. Abou 10,255 people were provided with food for nearly two months starting from April, 2020.

RYDT staff also provided breakfast and lunch for 10 police staff on duty outside our campus to control the movement of people for nearly two months.

I. Opinion:

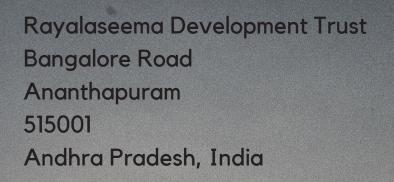
